For over 14 years, Fish Tails Bait and Tackle has been a cornerstone of Barnstead's recreational fishing community, offering not just quality live bait and tackle but also a sense of family and community spirit. Fish Tails stands out from other bait shops for many reasons, but the quality of their live bait is a key factor in what keeps anglers coming back—some even make a long drive from out of state just to purchase bait to take back with them. While many bait shops source a majority of their live bait from outside the area, Fish Tails prides itself on offering high quality native bait, including hellgrammites and native crayfish, species that are hard to find elsewhere in New Hampshire.

"Unlike other shops the water in our tanks isn't recycled, it definitely helps the bait live longer," Donnie shares. The shop's reputation for quality and its personal touch has earned it a loyal customer base of locals, summer residents, and tourists. Whether it is kids excited about catching their first fish or seasoned anglers prepping for their next big catch, Fish Tails is a hub for advice, stories, and tips. The Murzin family cherishes the relationships they've built with their customers over the years. "We love seeing the kids come in, there is nothing like the excitement on a kid's face when they catch their first fish," says Donnie.

Fish Tails is a proud sponsor of several local fishing derbies, including the Chase Family & Barnstead Parks & Rec Fishing Derby on Locke Lake, and the Michaud Ice Fishing Derby on Brindle Pond. This past year they also sponsored an Ice Fishing Derby on Suncook Lake to support veterans. "It's all about giving back to the community that's supported us," Donnie adds. With the opening of a second location in Meredith, and plans to add a hunting section to their new shop, Fish Tails Bait and Tackle is growing, but it remains rooted in the same values that started it all: family, community, and a love for the outdoors. 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JEANNIE'S RECIPE CORNER

CHEX PUMPKIN PIE CRUNCH

Ingredients:

- 1/4 cup brown sugar
- 1 Tbsp pumpkin pie spice
- 1/4 cup butter
- 2 tsp vanilla

- 2 cups Cinnamon Chex cereal
- 2 Cups Honey Nut Chex cereal
- 2 cups Wheat or Rice Chex cereal
- 8 ounces pecans

Prep Tip: Maximize your microwave when it comes to making homemade party mixes, like this one has lots of fall's favorite flavors!

Mix can be made up to 2 weeks ahead and stored in an airtight container.



Directions:

- 1. In a small bowl, mix brown sugar and pumpkin pie spice; set aside.
- 2. In a small microwave -safe dish, microwave butter on high for 30 seconds or until melted. Stir in vanilla.
- 3. In a large microwave-safe bowl, mix all cereals and pecans. Pour butter mixture over cereal mixture, stirring until evenly distributed. Add sugar and spice mixture and stir until coated.
- 4. Microwave uncovered on high 5 minutes or until mixture begins to brown, stirring every minute.
- 5. Spread on wax paper or a cookie sheet to cool. Store in airtight container. I usually make 4 or 5 batches —they make great little treats to give friends. I hope that you enjoy the treats!!

Holiday Hints:

- Pick the right menu. To spend more time with guest, look for recipes that can be made ahead of time.
- Rely on your refrigerator and organize it well beforehand so that platters, containers and beverages are easy to get to.
- Crockpot recipes are great for cooking and keeping your food warm.
- Check it off: There are many to do ahead of time—set your table the nite before. Gather platters and serving dishes and utensils, wash and cover with a dry dish towel so they will be ready for the big day. Give the kids a job, too—like doing a vacuuming thru the house, taking out the trash: setting flowers about, maybe helping peel the veggies or stuff the celery.
