BARNSTEAD HISTORICAL SOCIETY

Have you ever given much thought to the post offices in Barnstead—when they were established and where they were located? Their locations are designated as Barnstead, South Barnstead, Center Barnstead, and North Barnstead.

Prior to around 1814, there had been no post office here. The first one was established on Province Road, near the southwest corner of the town. Charles Hodgdon was the first postmaster. He was succeeded by Charles Hodgdon, Jr., Charles J. Hodgdon, Noah Robinson, and Samuel D. Nutter, though perhaps not all served in the same locality.

Barnstead (Parade) Post Office

Postmasters: Hazen Wheeler, Eliphalet S. Nutter, Jonathan M. Tasker, Daniel Chesley, Joseph P. Russell, and Cyrus W. Blanchard.

Barnstead Center Post Office

Postmasters: Isaac O. Barnes, John Kent, Jeremiah Elkins, John Peavey, Daniel Bickford, Noah C. Huntress, E. C. Drew, Laban M. Saunders, Seth Tasker, and Thomas M. Huse.

North Barnstead Post Office

Postmasters: Samuel Webster, Thomas P. Hodgdon, Robert S. Webster, Charles E. Walker, and William C. Berry.

South Barnstead Post Office

Postmasters: Edward Walker and Charles Reynolds.

Many changes have taken place since 1814. Today, we have two post offices, two zip codes, and home delivery service.

Secret Kiss Cupcakes 3 1/3 cups all purpose flour



2 cups sugar
1 cup baking cocoa
2 tsp baking soda
1 tsp salt
2 cups buttermilk
1 cup butter, melted
2 eggs, lightly beaten
2 tsp vanilla

30 milk chocolate kisses 1 can (16 ounces) fudge frosting

In a bowl, combine the flour, sugar, cocoa, baking soda and salt; mix well. Combine the buttermilk, melted butter, eggs and vanilla.

Add to the dry ingredients; Mix well. Fill paper-lined muffin pan 2/3 full. Press a chocolate kiss into the center of each cupcake until batter completely covers candy.

Bake at 375 degrees for 20-25 minutes or until toothpick inserted into the cake comes out clean.

Cool 10 minutes before removing from pans to wire racks to cool completely.

Frost cupcakes. Makes about 2 1/2 dozen.

You could also make your own frosting if you don't like using frosting from a can. Add some Valentine sprinkles to dress them up.
