Somewhere along the way we've been brainwashed by "Big Business" to think we absolutely must buy things we don't need, like fancy buttercream-frosted cupcakes. Business folk are very good at this type of manipulation, and I totally get why we fall for their wily tricks (especially if they tell us fancy buttercream-frosted cupcakes are the secret to life, because that is entirely believable). They're also quite adept at making it seem like we're making our own choices when we're just parroting what somebody else said (e.g., life without fancy buttercream-frosted cupcakes is meaningless). That somebody is very likely someone on their marketing team, who is also very good at picking the right group to share their 'message' with, which gets the group to do the work of passing the marketer's misinformation along, for free. So efficient! (And more than a little bit evil.)

The act of buying coffee drinks, for example, has become symbolic for younger generations as a means of demonstrating how older individuals don't understand today's economy (or anything, really). Older people: "You youngins can save money by not buying those swanky, though admittedly delicious, coffee drinks every day and making your own boring brew like I do." Local Business Spotlight: Farm to Table - Lorren Joyce Farm's Local Impact

Lorren Joyce Farm, nestled on 25+ acres with 13 acres of open pasture in Center Barnstead, New Hampshire, is far more than a source for natural, local food—it is a heartfelt tribute to the people and values that shaped its founders. Owned and operated by Brian and Amy Matarozzo, the farm is named in honor of Amy's mother, Joyce, and her uncle, Lorren, both of whom have passed away. The name Lorren Joyce is a daily reminder of their legacy.

Amy's passion for farming was sparked in childhood through 4-H and deepened by years working on dairy farms. These experiences instilled in her a commitment to doing things the right way—never taking shortcuts, always prioritizing the health and well-being of her animals. Founded in December 2013 at its first location in Londonderry, NH, Lorren Joyce Farm moved to Barnstead in August 2014, transforming a property that once had only a house and a goat shed into a thriving agricultural hub.

Today, Lorren Joyce Farm specializes in products that reflect this ethos: natural, raw milk and cream from registered Jersey cows (renowned for their rich, high-butterfat milk), pasture-raised beef, farm-fresh eggs, pork, and compost. Amy's herd of Jersey cows is not only the backbone of the farm but also her pride and joy.

Each cow has a name and personality, and even the retired cows live out their days in comfort. "The cows," Amy says, "are my favorite part of farming. I love them. I talk to them and they each have their own personality. I'm better with cows than I am with people".

Amy and Brian's influence extends well beyond their own farm. Both serve as President of the Belknap County Farm Bureau, and Amy is the state coordinator for young farmers with the New Hampshire Farm Bureau. She also serves on the county FSA Board, advocating for local producers and helping to shape the future of agriculture in the region.

For Amy, farming is not just a business—it's a way of life rooted in family, hard work, and a deep love for her animals. Raising her own two boys on the farm, she hopes to pass on these values. Lorren Joyce Farm stands as a testament to the enduring power of family, community, and doing things the right way. Lorren Joyce Farm continues to honor its namesakes—Lorren and Joyce—by nurturing both the land and the community, one bottle of milk and one pasture-raised steak at a time.

CIVICS 101

Public Speaking

Speaking up at public municipal meetings can feel scary, but it's a powerful way to let your elected officials know how you would like them to make decisions. Here are some tips to help overcome the fear and make your voice heard:

1. Prepare in Advance:

- Research the topic you want to address and gather supporting facts or examples.
- Write down your key points so you can refer to them if you feel nervous.
- Try to make sure you stick to one main point or question – what is the one thing you want everyone to understand about your perspective?
- Practice what you want to say out loud, either alone or with a trusted friend or family member.

2. Start Small:

- Attend a few meetings as an observer.
- Read over Meeting Notes! This is a great way to make sure you are up to date on the topic you feel passionate about.
- Try speaking on less controversial topics to get used to public speaking. This is a great way to develop relationships with committee members, and to get comfortable with your own style of speaking.

3. Use Your Own Words:

- Speak authentically and from the heart. People appreciate sincerity and honesty more than polished perfection. It's ok to stumble over words, mess up, or make other mistakes.
- Focus on your message, and not the reactions of people who may disagree with you. It's ok for people to have different points of view.

4. Take It One Step at a Time:

- You don't have to say everything all at once. It's okay to start with a brief comment or question.
- Celebrate each small step toward becoming more comfortable with public speaking.

What is the difference between a public input session, and a discussion during the annual

Town Meeting?

- **Public Input Sessions** are time held aside during every Committee and Board meeting that allows for members of the public to share their thoughts, opinions, and ideas. These sessions are often informal and allow the members of the Committees or Boards to hear feedback from the public while shaping a project, warrant article, budget, or other proposal. The topics are broad, or are issues the public wants to bring forward for future action or discussion.
- **Discussions during annual Meetings:** These are decision-focused dialogue sessions where members of the public, officials, experts, and others provide information with the goal of reaching some kind of decision. The topic is focused only on the decision up for vote at that time and ends once everyone has spoken or someone calls the question so the public can vote on it.

What does it mean when I'm speaking, and someone calls "Point of order!"?

- This means that the person feels that you have left the central point or topic of discussion, or that the Moderator or Chair needs to clarify a meeting rule that isn't being followed.

Does this mean that what I am saying is not important?

- No! What you are saying IS important. It is hard to have a full discussion about a topic in a single meeting. Committee Chairs and Moderators are responsible for making sure the meeting gets things done within the timeframe of the meeting itself. If a speaker tries to address multiple points within a single statement, and some of those points are outside of the decision that is being addressed, the Chair or Moderator's job is to re-direct people so that a decision can be reached in a timely manner.
- Attending meetings and being up to date on an issue is the best way to stay on-topic during a discussion period. However, it's hard to attend meetings. When you can't attend a meeting, reading the Committee or Board's meeting notes can help you. By reading through meeting notes, you can be informed and understand how to make your point clearly and in a way that people will understand.

Barnstead Historical Society: Center Barnstead Cemetery

The Center Barnstead Cemetery, located behind Fire Station 2, is one of Barnstead's older cemeteries, with stones dating back to the early 1800s. The cemetery boasts a unique three- tiered design.

Family names include Foss, Huntress, Shackford, and Nutter. Here you will find the final resting place of Oscar and Sarah Foss, benefactor of the town's library, and their young daughter Inez. You will also find the sad tale of James Davis.

James was born in Barnstead in 1835. In 1861 he enlisted in the Union Army at the age of 26. He was wounded, captured by the Confederate Army of Florida in 1864, and escaped in that same year. He died at the age of 81 in 1921. He was returned to Barnstead and was placed in the vault for future burial. For unknown reasons, perhaps lack of family, he was sadly forgotten and left in the vault until he was discovered in 1977 when he was finally properly buried.

LRMHC provides services for people with mental illness and their families. They offer counseling and psychotherapy for seniors, adults and children and their family. They offer ongoing and emergency counseling services, as well as substance misuse treatment.

JEANNIE'S RECIPE CORNER

PINEAPPLE CHICKEN SALAD SANDWICHES

- 2 cups cubed chicken breast
- ½ cup crushed pineapple, drained
- ¼ cup chopped pecans
- ¼ cup chopped celery
- 2 tbsp finely chopped onion
- ½ cup mayonnaise
- ¼ tsp onion salt
- ¼ tsp garlic salt or powder
- ¼ tsp paprika
- 6 lettuce leaves
- 6 sandwich rolls, split

Instructions:

In a small bowl, combine the first six ingredients. In a separate bowl, mix the mayonnaise, onion salt, garlic powder, and paprika. Add this to the chicken mixture and stir until well combined. Serve on lettuce-lined rolls.

Serves: 6

Pair with your favorite potato chips and a handful of colorful grapes.

Short on time? Use a rotisserie chicken, or ask the deli to cut a thick slice of cooked chicken breast sandwich meat for you to dice at home.

It's light, easy to make, and delicious!

MANDARIN ORANGE AND BANANA PUDDING

- 2 pkg instant vanilla pudding
- 15 oz can of mandarin oranges (drained)
- 2-3 bananas, sliced
- 1 pint heavy cream, whipped

Instructions:

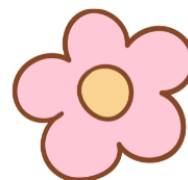
Prepare the pudding according to the package directions. Let it sit until it begins to thicken, then stir in the mandarin oranges. Refrigerate until fully chilled.

Before serving, add the sliced bananas and whipped cream, and gently fold them into the pudding.

(I like to save a little whipped cream to dollop on top, along with a slice of banana or a piece of mandarin orange for a pretty finish.)
