The advisory committee for the Gordon Preston Outstanding Community Service Award will review the nominations and select one recipient that exemplifies the spirit of the award.


Barn Building and Preservation with Red Fox Carpentry



Barn Building is, in a way, a thing of the past. Old farm land is being subdivided into smaller house lots, and barns are being replaced with modern-day garages or sheds. Today some barns are made using modern-day pre-fabrication methods or steel frames and it becomes harder and harder to find a true timber framer. With wood cost on the rise and the overall cost of doing business going up every day, we can't blame the consumer for overlooking the traditional methods of true craftsmanship. However it's not just the cost that keeps inching up, but the age of the seasoned carpenters themselves. Who will be around the replace these relics of the past? Who will be here to preserve or erect these monumental barns of the North East? When Jared Hanselman, of Red Fox Carpentry, moved to Barnstead, New Hampshire in 2015 (a native from Chester, NH), he was set on his goal of preserving and building barns. Starting with his own farm, The Fox and Crow Farm, he and his wife designed structures that were most suitable for their livestock or storage.

In 2016, at the age 26, Jared found himself honorably self-employed and building barns. Now, at the start of 2022, Jared has returned to NH from a barn building project in Ohio and has started his newest barn project for a wedding venue in Sanbornton, NH. His portfolio of monuments keeps growing as does his reputation of hard work, professionalism and reliability. ORIGINAL DIVISION OF LAND IN BARNSTEAD Source: History and Genealogy of the Barnstead Early Settlers from 1727 to 1979 by Stuart Merrill

Barnstead was originally laid out in three separate divisions, with the first division established in 1731. Starting at the then-Barrington town line, it ran west 2½ miles. It then traveled 4½ miles north, along now what is known as Province Road. There were 120 original lots of 60 acres each in 12 ranges, 10 lots in each range. A 15 rod road ran north and south, with a 20 rod road running east and west. A rod is a unit of measurement, usually length, roughly 16½ feet.

In 1763, the second division was laid out, beginning on the west side of the first division, running west to the Gilmanton town line. There were 8 ranges, with 12 lots in each range. A 4 rod road ran between each range.

The third and last division was laid out in 1797 and is referred to as the "John Cate Plan." The town exchanged land with Mr. John Fisher of Salem for several lots in the first and second divisions in 1770, approximately 2,000 acres near the Alton town line. He then sold off lots in the area of what is now North Road. The rest was divided into 14 lots, running north and south, much of which is now Locke Lake Colony.

One of the original proprietors of Barnstead was the Rev. Joseph Adams of Newington, who purchased several lots in the first division. His younger brother was President John Adams. This is now the area around Adams Pond that includes T.L. Storer Boy Scout Camp. The town charter required that houses for public worship be built within three years. Rev. Adams selected a parcel of land near a stream along the Strafford town line and built a meetinghouse of logs.

The second meetinghouse followed in the Parade around 1788 and finished in 1799. This was the first framed church edifice in Barnstead, on land donated by Eli Bunker. The Second Congregational Meetinghouse was the third built in 1803 on land donated by John Tasker, Esq., near his residence. The north meetinghouse followed in 1820. The Center meetinghouse was erected in 1840. The Freewill Baptist Meetinghouse was also built during this time.

RECIPE CORNER

Banana Split Cake

Ingredients;

For Crust:

2 cups graham crackers

34 cup white sugar

1/4 lb. Butter, melted

For Cake:

½ lb. Confectioners' sugar

2 (8 oz.) packages cream cheese

1/4 lb. Melted butter

3 bananas, sliced

fresh/frozen strawberries, sliced

15 oz. can crushed pineapple, drained

12 oz. container of Cool Whip

12 oz. peanuts or walnuts, crushed

Chocolate chips

16 oz. jar maraschino cherries

Mix graham cracker crumbs and butter together and spread (pressing down firmly) over the bottom of a 9x13 dish. Refrigerate until chilled.

Beat sugar, cream cheese, and butter together and layer over crumbs. Slice 3 bananas, fresh strawberries (or frozen and drained), and pineapple and layer on crumbs and filling.

Cover cake with cool whip and decorate with nuts and chocolate chips.

Refrigerate and serve chilled.
