Tis the season for spooky things, so I thought I'd write about this unique New England convention I've discovered, where apparently you can establish a cemetery twenty feet from your house and no one bats an eye. Talk about efficient! When we first moved to Barnstead, our family was chatting about all the perks of our new house, and my youngest son, who was four at the time, offered this little nugget: "And if one of us dies, we have a place close by to bury them!" It goes without saying that I'm grateful we haven't had to test the legality of doing this. Yet, anyway.

We didn't have that sort of thing in Minnesota - you know, the burying people in your yard thing. Or maybe we did, we just didn't let on that we did. Being primarily of Scandinavian descent in my neighborhood, we tended to keep things to ourselves and our graveyards far from our homes. Here in New Hampshire you put them where you can keep an eye on them. In our case, that's right from our living room. When our dog, Dorrie, was a little puppy she used to make a beeline for one of the gravestones in our little graveyard that belonged to a woman who had died very young (she was 20). Little Dorrie would sit directly facing the gray headstone, her chocolate brown head cocked to one side as though carefully listening (something she never did for me). I can only imagine the conversation that was going on.

While I'm not quite as cute and entertaining as a puppy. I still try to visit our cemetery when I can, picking up branches from nearby trees and leaving flowers in glass jars to brighten up the place, singing mournful dirges as I go about my business. The residents haven't yet tried to scare me off, so I must not sound too awful. Or they're just that desperate for company

This past Farm Day, the Barnstead Historical Society hooked me up with a list of people buried in our cemetery, and strangely, I found two names on the list that weren't written on the headstones we have. There's a rough remnant of what looks like a tombstone, and a small, upright stone that might also be a headstone, but no names on either one. Are those two extra names supposed to be attached to those bits of stone? I wish I knew.

One of my favorite Barnstead graveyards is the circular hill cemetery behind the fire station. I visited it years ago, before I started working at the library, but when I went there recently to take pictures for this article I found a now familiar name: Foss. As in Oscar and Sarah Ursula Foss. Sarah made the town library possible, and then dedicated it to her husband, Oscar. Now that's a providential find. And maybe just a wee bit eerie.

The graveyards of Barnstead - of any town, really have stories to tell, and if you listen quietly, head cocked to one side in earnest concentration, you might just hear them. Or me singing. Either way, what a treat!

Journaling is a creative process where people use images, words, quotes, doodles, drawings and more to convey a moment or a feeling. Wait. Did you just shudder imagining yourself having to draw something? Never fear! Journaling is more about saving thoughts and observations than making artistic masterpieces. Even better, your notebook can center around any theme, mundane or fantastical, that you want, like books you've read and movies you've watched. You could even make a weekly planner, a dream journal, a vision board, or a daily diary. You don't have to draw, either. Maybe you prefer to capture your thoughts and ideas in the form of poetry or photography. There are a million ways to journal creatively, and I encourage everyone to tackle a blank page!

In nature journaling, the goal is to achieve focused awareness when you're outdoors. That is, being present in the moment while in nature. Nature journaling provides an opportunity for you to stop and smell the roses, a sort of meditation where instead of quieting your mind, you release your curiosity to roam loud and free. Nature journaling asks, "What do I notice about this rose?" and "I wonder why roses smell so nice?" It also encourages you to say, "This rose reminds me of..." and "The scent makes me feel..."

Nature journaling is a wonderful activity for all ages. Maria Montessori said, "We cannot create observers by saying, 'observe,' but by giving them the power and the means for this observation and these means are procured through education of the senses." One great thing about nature journals is that they record a moment we can return to and learn from at a later time. A child may watch an orange butterfly floating around a patch of flowers, record the moment in squiggles, then learn in school or in a book that the butterfly's name is Danaus plexippus (aka the Monarch). The child may then feel inspired to learn more about the history, food, migration, and threats to the Monarch butterfly, thus transforming her into a citizen scientist. Citizen scientists are the everyday people of all ages who notice these little moments. When we observe what is around us, we become better caretakers of our outside world.

Journaling is an inspiring process that can help us learn and grow through focused awareness. If you're interested in accessing resources on creative or nature journaling, please come to the library! We have books on bullet journaling, collage making, hand lettering, sewing fabric images, and guides on nature, watercolor, and more. The website www.johnmuirlaws.com is also a wonderful resource for anyone interested in watching videos and demonstrations on the topic of journaling.

From the Recipe Book comes this yummy cake, originally submitted by Mrs. Lloyd Hanson. The Hanson family has deep roots in South Barnstead, and originally owned a store in town that included a Post Office.

Apple Supreme Cake

4 cups chopped apples
2 cups flour
1¾ cups sugar
2 tsp. soda
2 eggs
1 tsp. salt
½ c. Crisco Oil
2 tsp. cinnamon
2 tsp. vanilla
½ c. chopped nuts

Combine apples and sugar; set aside. In a large bowl, mix eggs, oil, and vanilla. Beat 1 minute on medium speed. Add dry ingredients alternately with apples and sugar mixture. Stir in nuts.

Use a large cake pan. Bake at 350-degree for 45-50 minutes. Do not underbake.

George Wilkes lived above the Pitman Farm by about a mile on his own farm on the west side of the road. Sometimes, when the snow was bad, he and his family lived in Farmington, but most of the time, they lived in Barnstead. This was a time before television and radio and the means of entertaining was conversation and telling stories. As for telling stories, George said that always making them totally truthful was not a prerequisite. You see it is better to have a good yarn, which is not a true story than tell a boring one that is not totally true.
