**Dorothy Cotton's Divinity Fudge** 

4 cups sugar
2 egg whites, beaten stiff
1 cup Karo
1 tsp. vanilla
1 cup boiling water
1/2 cup chopped nuts

Mix sugar, water and Karo. Boil until the mixture threads when tried from a spoon. Pour slowly on egg whites, beating until creamy. Add nuts and vanilla. Drop into lumps on waxed paper or a buttered pan.

The Glad Game is all about optimism and finding things to be grateful for in every situation. Pollyanna goes on to teach everyone in her community about the Glad Game and shares her gratitude and joy everywhere she goes. As a result, when she has an accident and finds herself at a low point where she can't muster up her own gratitude, her community comes together to show her how much of a difference she has made in the people around her.

I think of this philosophy often, but especially during this time of year when gratitude is at the forefront of my mind. It reminds me of how much I love living in our small town, how important we all are to one another, and how much power we have to make each other's lives a little better.

I have had the privilege of being the director at Oscar Foss Memorial Library for almost eight years now. #### A Note from the Trustees of the Trust Funds about Cemeteries

The Trustees of the Trust Funds...three people who are seldom seen or heard from. It's that strange item on the town ballot each March no one thinks much about. So to clarify, we are the custodians of the town's perpetual care funds, charitable trusts, and capital reserve/expendable trust funds. If you attend town meeting you'll know that every year funds are placed into these accounts, kind of like a savings account, stashed away until those funds are needed for something like a new fire truck, a bridge, or other items deemed as necessary by the Board of Selectmen.

The perpetual care funds are typically funds established when a cemetery was created many, many years ago. Barnstead has more than 120 of these cemeteries. These funds cannot be used for general maintenance or improvements of the cemetery. The funds can only be used for care of specific lots, which were established when the fund was created.

Most of these cemeteries are small family lots. You drive by them every day. For example: Dow and Hodgdon near the corner of Peacham and North Barnstead Roads; Tasker and Winkley near Hannah Nutter Road on Route 126; Rev. David Garland on Beauty Hill Road. Many are not visible from the road; you need to put on your boots and take a hike through the woods to find these forgotten families.

Since the death of Stuart Merrill in 2017, trustees have been using his original list of cemeteries to develop an actual inventory, with GPS coordinates, for a more up-to-date list. The current list is in "The History and Genealogy of the Barnstead Early Families from 1727 to 1970" available for review at our town library (OFML), or copies can be purchased from the Historical Society.

Like most things, there are specific laws and rules regarding cemeteries. RSA 289 outlines the state laws regarding cemeteries. New cemeteries cannot simply be created, nor can someone utilize an existing cemetery near their property. Think about it... Do you know the exact location of where remains lie? If it were your family, how would you feel about someone messing around with your loved ones?

One last item: If you have a cemetery that abuts your property, please verify with the town that the tax record shows the correct boundaries of the cemetery.
