

#### **The Suncook Valley Railroad**

In January 1849, the New Hampshire General Court granted a charter to John Berry and associates for the Suncook Valley Railroad between Pittsfield and Suncook. Later that year, the Suncook Valley Railroad Extension was granted; however, the company ran out of money. The following year, the original charter was nullified. It wasn't until 1863 that a new charter would be approved for both the original line and the extension, with the first train traveling from Suncook to Pittsfield in 1869. Twenty years later, in 1889, the first train arrived in Barnstead.

There were two depots: one in the Parade, between the Parade Grounds and the River; and one in the Center, between the two rivers, on what is now referred to as the Timco property. The original plan called for the train to continue on to Alton, but that never materialized. A turntable was located in the Center, near where the buses are now parked, allowing the train to reverse its direction and head back south.

The train was used for multiple purposes. Passenger service was available from Barnstead to Pittsfield, Suncook, Hooksett, and on to Manchester. Freight, including milk and other cargo, was the mainstay of the line for many years, including the mail, which proved to be the most lucrative contract.

Despite workforce shortages during two World Wars, derailments, hurricanes, and the resulting floods, rail service continued to run in Barnstead until 1943 when service beyond Pittsfield was discontinued. The depot in the Parade still stands as a private home, while the depot in the Center is a memory preserved in photos, along with the remnants of the trestle kayaks and boats pass through on the river.

# **Air Fryer Grilled Peaches**



# Ingredients:

- ¼ cup quick-cooking oats
- 2 tablespoons melted butter
- 2 teaspoons brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 3 medium peaches, halved and pitted




# **Directions**

- 1. Preheat the air fryer to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C).
- 2. Combine oats, butter, brown sugar, cinnamon, and vanilla in a small bowl. Set aside.
- 3. Spoon out some of the flesh of the peaches. Place peaches skin side up into the air fryer basket. Air fry for 5 minutes. Turn peaches over and spoon 1/2 tablespoon of the oat mixture into each cavity. Air fry until oats are golden brown and crispy, 2 to 3 minutes more.
