Education in Barnstead

On March 15, 1792, town meeting approved to have "agents in each school district, to build a school-house in each district" (Jeremiah P. Jewett's History of Barnstead New Hampshire). The first teacher employed by the town, however, was Cornelius Kirby, in 1784, and his school was in the private home of William Newall in south part of town. By 1800, five schoolhouses had been built. Most were single room schools, with a handful that later became two rooms.

A ceremony opening the new elementary school was held on August 24, 1958. A handful of these original schoolhouses remain in use as private residences.



REAP

Are you age 60 or older, a caregiver or family member of an older adult living in NH, or living in a NH Senior Housing site and in need of counseling support?

REAP (Referral, Education and Assistance and Prevention Program) may be for you! Counselors are trained to help you with stress, relationships, family dynamics, grief, emotional well-being, substance use, quality of life or other personal concerns.

REAP is a program that is free of cost and counselors can meet with you in the privacy of your own home, or elsewhere if preferred, and also provides information by phone.

REAP provides education to help you better understand and deal with the many life-changes you might encounter. The program is designed to help you take control of your life, and to live a happy, healthy, and independent lifestyle.
