March Library Happenings

Good to Know Info: We are closed for staff training on the second Thursday of every month until 3:00. Election Day is Tuesday, Mar. 12. We will be closed two Saturdays in a row for the Barnstead Town Meeting (3/16) and the Barnstead School Meeting (3/23). Both meetings start at 9:00 a.m. and are held at the elementary school. These meetings are for residents to vote on important town and school matters, along with their budgets.

March is Women's History Month. Here at the library we will have a display of books about and/or written by amazing and incredible women for you to view and check out. Stop by and jot down a sentence or two about the women who inspire you!

Every Wednesday at 10:30, Children's Storytime is the main event here at the library! Come experience the gift of adventurous stories, hearty sing-alongs, and creative crafting. It's a great way to meet new friends and learn new skills. If you want to stick around, our children's area is filled with comfy bean bag chairs, puppets, Legos, trains, tons of children's books, and more. If you have a little one, the library can be a lot of fun!

Start your week off with Yoga Monday! Gentle Hatha-Flow runs from 10:15-11:40, Senior/Beginner/Chair Yoga is 12:00-1:00, and Intermediate Hatha-Flow lasts from 5:30-6:50. Classes are by donation (suggested \$8). All are welcome and encouraged to attend, regardless of ability to donate.

It's a Percy Jackson Watch Party, and it's happening Friday Mar. 1, from 3:00-7:30! It's mid-winter break, folks, so come join us here at the library to watch Percy Jackson from Disney+. We'll start at the beginning of the series and get through as many episodes as we can. We'll have light snacks and refreshments, too.

The Peeps are back in town! Between Mar. 1 and Mar. 19, enter your most creative Peeps diorama based on a book. Entries should be roughly the size of a shoebox, all characters should be made from Peeps, and limit one entry per person or family/team. Be sure to put your age (or "adult") and name on entries. Dioramas will be on display for public voting from Mar. 20-Mar. 31, and prizes will be awarded on Apr. 2.

Mar. 6-10 is Read Across America Week: Celebrating Dr. Seuss' Birthday! Join us in celebrating Dr. Seuss' Birthday at OFML. Find your child's favorite book, discover a new author, and spend quality time reading to your child at the library. We will also have games, activities, and crafts to do all week during library hours.

Our Meet and Read Book Club (ages 18+) happens on the first Wednesday of the month (Mar. 6, from 6:00-7:30), and takes place in the library's Meeting Room. (Feel free to bring food for yourself and/or to share.) This month's book will be Murder on the Orient Express by Agatha Christie. Be sure to pick up a copy here at the library, then join fellow bibliophiles to 'express' your opinions about murder (most foul!), trains, the great author herself, or whatever comes to mind. Next month's book is Anil's Ghost by Michael Ondaantje.

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Thursday, Mar. 7, from 5:00-7:00 we are holding our first annual Adult Repair Fair. Repair, reuse, recycle! Bring your small household items, clothes, or technology in need of repair or mending to the library and we will help you fix it or try to put you in touch with someone who can.

From Tuesday, Mar. 12 to Saturday, Mar. 16, we are featuring Leprechauns in the Library! What does that mean? Well, for those 5 days before St. Patrick's Day, the little guys will be hiding their gold in the childrens' area. If you find a piece of treasure, bring it to the front desk to exchange it for a prize. It should be a good craic, to be sure!

Thursday Mar. 14 (3.14). It's Pi Day! To celebrate, we are holding a pie tasting contest. So if you're feeling full of piety, bring in a pie to share and/or be judged. We don't open until 3:00 that day, so please drop off your savory, sweet, filled with numbers—it's all good—pie between 3:00 and 4:00 on that day. Entries need a name, contact info, and the type of pie. Our staff will most piously be doing the judging. We'll have a prize for the best pie and prizes for anyone who can recite a few pi digits.

Family Crafternoon - where everybody can be an artist! - happens every third Friday of the month and runs from 4:00-5:00. This month (Mar. 15), we are featuring Spring Art Painting. Release your inner artist, and join us for an afternoon of creating spring-inspired art. We will provide the materials, but supplies are limited so please call or email the library to reserve a spot! We will be offering light snacks for your munching pleasure.

Mar. 19: Spring Equinox. Spring is springing on this first day of spring, which makes me happy! And which also means it's time to start thinking about planting season. To help our patrons with that task, the library will be giving out free seed packets while supplies last. (FYI: Mar. 20, also sometimes the Spring Equinox, is Alien Abduction Day, but we can't help you with that.)

NEW! The OFML Sewcial Club will meet the 3rd (3/20) and 4th (3/27) Wednesday of the month from 12:30-3:30. Guests can bring any sewing or quilting project they are working on (along with their sewing machines and supplies) to the library to socialize and share tips while they sew.


EASTER EGG HUNT

FROM THE TOWN REPORT OF FEBRUARY 15, 1900 REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

Fellow Townsman:

I herewith submit my report for the year ending Feb 15,1900. Unless you have closely observed the progress of our public library you can hardly realize its great importance. It is well known that our library contains many valuable works, and it is only by giving a fare [sic] share of time to them that our young people can obtain that knowledge which is required to give strength and support to all. I feel we should be as liberal in our appropriation as the financial condition of our town will warrant. Books—

Number of books in the library, not including public

documents - 1162

Accressions [sic], by purchase - 207

By gift, including public documents - 16

Circulation, number of persons who have taken

books - 374

Receipts, amount received from fines and cards -

\$4.99

Classification. Class of books most in use, fiction, 2nd books for your people. 3rd- travels, 4th- history,

5th-biography

The books should be catalogued.

The library will be open for delivery of books on Tuesday and Saturday afternoons and evenings, (except legal holidays) from 2 to 5 o'clock and from 7 to 9 o'clock.

NEW PASTOR AT CCNB

The Congregational Church of North Barnstead has a wonderful new pastor, Rev. Kate Kennedy. In the same year, she was also elected state representative and was completing her studies for a Master's in Social Work. RECIPE CORNER

SWISS VEGETABLE CASSEROLE

1 can (10 3/4 oz.) Campbell's Cream of Mushroom Soup 2/3 cup sour cream

1/4 tsp ground black pepper

1/4 top ground black pepper

2 bags frozen vegetable combo, thawed

(broccoli, cauliflower, carrots)

11/2 can French's Fried Onions

1 cup shredded Swiss Cheese

In a bowl, stir mushroom soup, sour cream, pepper, vegetables, 2/3 cup fried onions and 1/2 cup of cheese together and pour into a 9"x 13" dish and cover.

Bake at 350 degrees for 35 to 40 minutes or until the veggies

are tender.

Sprinkle the remaining onions and cheese over the veggie mixture.

Bake for an additional 5 minutes. Makes about 8 servings.

This would go well with your Easter Ham Dinner (March 31st)
