# MARCH LIBRARY HAPPENINGS

**Good to Know Info:** We are closed for staff training on the second Thursday of every month until 3:00 (Mar. 12). Election Day is Tuesday, Mar. 10. The library will be closed two Saturdays in a row for the Barnstead Town Meeting (3/14) and the Barnstead School Meeting (3/21). Both meetings start at 9:00 a.m. and are held at the elementary school. These meetings are for residents to vote on important town and school matters, along with their budgets.

“Pets of OFML” 2026 desk calendars are still for sale for \$8! Proceeds from our desk calendar sales go to fund library programs. This would make a great gift for all the pet lovers in your life, and support literacy at the same time. Hurry in and get your copy today!

March is Women’s Herstory Month! Here at the library we will have a display of books about and/or written by amazing and incredible women for you to view and check out.

The Peeps are in the diorama house! Between Mar. 3 and Mar. 19, enter your most creative Peeps diorama based on a book. Entries should be roughly the size of a shoebox, all characters should be made from Peeps, and limit one entry per person or family/team. Be sure to put your age (or “adult”) and name on entries. Dioramas will be on display for public voting from Mar. 20-Mar. 31, and prizes will be awarded on Apr. 1.

**Home School Group:** Run by group members and takes place at the library meeting room on Fridays from 10:30-12:30. Involves a mix of stories, simple science/learning activities, and a creative art/craft activity that all go along with a theme for the week. The activities are geared towards kids ages 4 and up, and younger siblings are welcome to come along. There will be an event posted ahead of time on the group’s Facebook page (Barnstead NH Library Homeschool Group) for each weekly meet-up, so you’ll always know what to expect and if you need to bring anything.

**Music and Movement Storytime, aka Littles Love to Learn!** Join us on Tuesdays at 10:30 for an interactive storytime filled with stories, songs, and loads of sensory play designed specifically for toddlers.

Every Wednesday at 10:30 is Children’s Storytime. Visit us at the library for stories, crafts, and singing. Then experience the cozy ambience in the children’s area, which has all sorts of neat things to do. Make new friends. Set up playdates. Check out books, movies, and games, play with the trains, Legos, and puppets. Come for the learning, stay for the fun!

Start your week off with Yoga Monday! Gentle Hatha-Flow runs from 10:15-11:40, Senior/Beginner/Chair Yoga is 12:00-1:00, and Intermediate Hatha-Flow lasts from 5:30-6:50. Classes are by donation (suggested \$8). All are welcome and encouraged to attend, regardless of ability to donate.

**Read Across America Week** is coming! Join us in celebrating Dr. Seuss’ Birthday at OFML during the week of Mar. 3-7. **Jamming Tuesdays at OFML: 6:00-8:00 (ages 18+).** Do you play a string instrument? Well then, dust it off and come make music with us! On the first (Mar. 3) and third (Mar. 17) Tuesdays of the month, join us for jam nights at the library (in the meeting room). No need to be an expert—just bring your instrument and a love of music. Share a few tunes, trade chords, get feedback (if you’d like), and most of all, have fun!

**\*NEW\*** On the first Wednesday of the month (Mar. 4), starting at 3:30, we are hosting a Young Readers Book Club for students in Kindergarten through 5th grade. Participants will have the opportunity to share and recommend their favorite books while explaining what makes those stories special to them. They will also be encouraged to ask questions and engage in thoughtful group discussions. We’ll wrap up the program with a simple craft activity, and light snacks will be provided.

Allow me to introduce myself—The Epicurious Barnsteadian, your anonymous guide on a delicious journey through the Lakes Region’s most mouth-watering food spots.

Before we embark on this grand culinary adventure, a note about how we’ll travel: this column will feature only the highlights. No negative reviews, no takedowns, no “gotcha” moments. Why? Because food is personal, kitchens are busy ecosystems, and even the best restaurants have days when the eggs won’t flip or the toast gets a little too ambitious. Instead of nitpicking, I’ll be shining a warm spotlight on the best of the best—the places that excel, surprise, comfort, and delight. If you see a restaurant featured here, it’s because they earned it.

And now, with that philosophy established, let’s begin where all good mornings should begin...

### **The Breakfast Whisperer:**

Good people of the Greater Barnstead Region, gather ’round—your humble culinary scout has ventured beyond Barnstead’s borders in search of breakfast glory. This time, my wandering fork led me to Belmont’s own J&J Yolk & Co., a small-but-mighty breakfast haven where the portions are generous, the food is hot, and the hashbrowns carry spiritual significance.

Let me set the scene: it’s a cozy little spot, the kind of place where you instantly wonder if you’re on a first-name basis with everyone and simply forgot. The menu reads like a classic small-town diner, but don’t let that familiar layout fool you. This kitchen has ambition, and they’re not shy about it.

Naturally, I began with the Irish Benny, featuring house-made corned beef hash. And when I say “house-made,” I don’t mean “poured from a can into a pan and aggressively stirred.” I mean truly homemade hash—crisp, hearty, and seasoned with what I can only assume is pride and a bit of culinary wizardry. Add perfectly poached eggs and a hollandaise that didn’t break, clump, or threaten to separate like a middle-school science experiment, and you have a benedict worthy of applause.

But wait—there’s more.

Because your intrepid Barnsteadian does not shy away from a challenge, I also ordered the Hungry Man's Breakfast, which arrived looking as though it had been prepared for a lumberjack, a competitive eater, or perhaps someone who had just outrun a moose. Every inch of that plate was executed beautifully. But the hashbrowns? Reader, I had a moment. Golden, crispy, expertly seasoned, and piping hot—these were the kind of potatoes that restore your faith in breakfast.

Despite the crowd-pleasing portions, everything arrived fresh and steaming. That's no small feat in the diner world, where one item is usually scalding while the rest linger in lukewarm limbo. On my next visit—and there will absolutely be a next visit—the giant house-made cinnamon roll will join my order. I spotted one at a neighboring table, and it has lived in my thoughts ever since.

If you haven't visited J&J Yolk & Co., consider this your friendly nudge. Belmont may be small, but this kitchen delivers big flavors—and a breakfast that satisfies both stomach and soul.

## Barnstead Historical Society



### New Hampshire Artistic Web

Located on Parade Hill Road near Hartshorn Road, New Hampshire Artistic Web created beautiful, intricate lace and corset trim, hat bands, suspender straps and trim on clothing, sheets and towels.

The Zecha family were immigrants from Austria, who brought with them Jacquard looms that produced scallops, ruffles, loops, and open-ladder designs, using technology so old, many had forgotten it. Originally, water wheel on the Suncook River provided power to the looms. In 1965, the switch was made to electricity.

In 1970's, when family interest in the mill waned, townspeople bought the company, which employed 40-50 people. After hiring a consulting firm, Eugene Wheeler stepped forward, and became the sole stockholder. Four years later, a second mill was purchased in Allenstown.

The Barnstead location continued to spin its web until 1994. On August 14, 1994, fire broke out in one of the oldest structures in town. What remains are memories and a collection of trim as featured in the photo.

Dear Editor,

On behalf of the Barnstead Planning Board, we encourage residents to review the four zoning ordinance amendments on the warrant for the March 2026 Town Election. These updates address accessory dwelling units (ADUs), short-term rentals (STRs), and minor housekeeping changes to keep our ordinance clear, consistent, and compliant with state law.

Question 1 aligns our ADU rules with RSA 674:71-73 (as amended by HB 577, 2025), allowing one ADU by right on single-family lots, with owner occupancy required. A yes vote supports family housing options while preserving neighborhood character; a no vote keeps stricter rules that may limit choices and conflict with state law.

Question 2 creates a permit system for STRs, requiring Planning Board approval, safety inspections, occupant/parking limits, and emergency postings. A yes vote adds oversight for safety and neighbor peace while permitting responsible rentals; a no vote leaves STRs unregulated, risking more disruptions.

Questions 3 and 4 are technical fixes: clarifying allowable uses across all districts and updating the permitted uses table to match the ADU/STR changes. A yes vote ensures consistency and avoids confusion; a no vote may perpetuate inconsistencies.

These amendments were drafted thoughtfully to promote housing, safety, and our small-town feel.





# Barnstead Zoning Updates: March 2026!

Hey Barnstead neighbors! We're proposing four changes to our town's zoning rules for the March 2026 Town Election. These updates will help make our community safer, more flexible for housing, and in line with state laws. This handout explains each question simply—what's changing, why, how it benefits you, and what a no vote means. We'll start with quick definitions:

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**Accessory Dwelling Unit (ADU):** A small, extra living space on the same lot as a single-family home, like a garage apartment or basement unit. It's for living in, not just storage.



**Short Term Rental (STR):** Renting out a home or part of it for short stays, like a weekend or vacation, often through apps like Airbnb.

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## Question 1: Updating Rules for Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs)

**What's Changing?** Rewriting our ADU section to match NH state law (RSA 674:71-73, updated by HB 577 in 2025). Allows one ADU per single-family lot by right—no extra approvals.

**Why?** Simple update to follow state rules and add housing choices.

**A Yes Vote Means:** Easier access to ADUs for families needing space for aging parents, young adults, or renters, potentially easing housing shortages while preserving the single-family neighborhood feel and increasing affordability and flexibility for multi-generational living.

**A No Vote Means:** Keeping the current, more restrictive ADU rules, which may limit housing options and not fully align with state law.

# Barnstead Zoning Updates: March 2026!

## Question 2: New Rules for Short Term Rentals (STRs)

**What's Changing?** Adding a section requiring STR owners to get a permit from the Planning Board, fire/safety checks, occupant limits, parking rules, and safety postings.

**Why?** To protect health, safety, and peace for renters and neighbors.

**A Yes Vote Means:** Implementing formal regulations for STRs to ensure safety (e.g., smoke alarms, emergency info) and reduce issues like noise or parking, while allowing responsible rentals that could attract tourism dollars.

**A No Vote Means:** No formal STR regulations or permits, potentially leading to unchecked rentals with more safety risks or neighbor complaints.

## Question 3: Clarifying General Zoning Requirements

**What's Changing?** Updating "Allowable Uses" to cover all districts (including suburban) and add: "No buildings, structures, or land shall be used for any purpose or in any manner other than that which is permitted in the district."

**Why?** Housekeeping fix recommended by town attorney for clarity.

**A Yes Vote Means:** Clearer rules that cover all districts, ensuring fair enforcement, preventing disputes, and promoting orderly growth across town.

**A No Vote Means:** Retaining the old wording, which might cause ongoing confusion about allowable uses in suburban districts.

## Question 4: Adding ADUs and STRs to the Permitted Uses Table

**What's Changing?** Adding "P" (Permitted) for ADUs in Suburban District and STRs in all zones (Village, Residential/Agriculture, Commercial, Industrial, Suburban).

**Why?** To match Questions 1 and 2 updates.

**A Yes Vote Means:** Consistent rules that explicitly permit ADUs and STRs in the intended districts, expanding housing and income options town-wide under the new guidelines.

**A No Vote Means:** The table stays unchanged, so ADUs and STRs might not be explicitly permitted in all intended districts, creating inconsistencies.

# Jeannie's Recipe Corner

## Swedish Brownies

These light, delicate Swedish Brownies are easy to make and even easier to enjoy. With a subtle almond flavor and a golden, slightly crisp top, they pair beautifully with an afternoon cup of tea or morning coffee.

### Ingredients

- 1 stick butter or margarine, melted and cooled
- 2 eggs, room temperature
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon almond extract
- 1 cup flour
- Pinch of salt
- Slivered almonds (for topping)
- About 1 tablespoon sugar (for topping)



### Directions

- Preheat oven to 325°F. Grease a 7" x 11" baking pan.
- Melt the butter and allow it to cool completely.
- In a mixing bowl, beat the eggs. Add the sugar and cream together until smooth. Stir in the almond extract, flour, and salt. Once combined, gently mix in the cooled butter until the batter is smooth.
- Pour into the prepared pan. Sprinkle slivered almonds evenly over the top, then sprinkle approximately 1 tablespoon of sugar over the almonds.
- Bake for about 35 minutes, or until golden brown. The finished bars should be light in texture with a lovely almond flavor.

Tip: Make sure your eggs are at room temperature and your butter has cooled before mixing. Warm butter can affect the texture and make the bars heavy.

Enjoy—and remember, we're getting closer to spring! 🌸
